For the past several years I have disposed of two trash cans of household waste at the Walker site about every three or four weeks. With a functioning scale I have NEVER paid more than the \$5 minimum fee for the two cans. Today was my first trip since the Mountain View Fire.

I was more than a little shocked to be told, after I had dumped my trash, that I had to pay \$7.50 rather than the usual \$5. There was ABSOLUTELY NO PUBLIC NOTIFICATION of this substantial increase.

I lift these trash cans in and out of my truck entirely by myself. I doubt that either one of these cans weighed more than 30 pounds.

WTF?

I previously wrote regarding the apparent price increase for trash disposal at the Walker Transfer Station. My two cans which NEVER cost more than the minimum of \$5 are now going to cost \$7.50 because they cannot be weighed.

California state law, Penal Code section 396, prohibits the increase in cost of goods or services by more than 10% following a declared disaster. The increase in the cost of disposing of my two cans of household trash has increased by 50%. If I also had my bin of vegetative waste, which still weighed little enough to stay below the weight limit for the minimum charge of \$5, my cost increase would be 100%.

Mono County is gouging the survivors of a declared disaster in violation of state law.
