Digital 395 update - Suddenlink has been testing the Digital 395 the circuit this week in Mammoth. The back-office testing has gone well, and as of Wednesday, they were able to meet the demand of the existing customers who are on a 3mbps connection. On Wednesday, they were supposed to be testing higher speeds (30 Mbps) for a few customers – Chairman Hunt may have been a test case.

If all goes successfully with that test, the plan is to provide higher speeds for all of the customers in the Mammoth area by Monday. This would provide existing customers with a 15 Mbps connection, up five times from what they were getting before. At the same time, they will begin taking on new customers. There is a waiting list of about 150 people in Mammoth.

Mono County Probation scores third in State for initial results in Evidence Based Program Application -The Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) announced the tentative results of the Request for Proposal (RFP) process conducted for the Evidence-Based Practices To Improve Public Safety (EBP-TIPS) Project.

An Executive Steering Committee (ESC), comprised of 6 subject-matter experts, read and rated each of the proposals that were submitted in response to the RFP. Based the funding available for this project and the scores recorded by the ESC, the proposals were ranked as follows:

- 1. Sonoma
- 2. Contra Costa
- 3. Mono
- 4. Mariposa
- 5. Tulare

The ranked order of proposals, as recommended by the ESC, will be heard by the BSCC Board on September 12, 2013. Please note that this action is subject to approval by the BSCC Board. Upon approval, the BSCC staff will contact grantees to confirm the Board's authorization of the grant awards and provide additional information relating to contract development and the Project Director's Orientation Meeting. Ground Crews Continue Work on the Spring Peak Fire Overnight

MINERAL COUNTY, NV/MONO COUNTY, CA- Ground crews worked hard overnight to obtain containment and perform mop-up. State Route 270 and State Route 167 are open providing the public with access to Bodie State Historic Park. The public is asked to drive slowly in the area and to park in the designated parking lots due to a large number of fire apparatus in the area. Crews will continue to focus their efforts to keep the fire out of the unburned 'green islands' within the fire perimeter in order to protect the bi-state sage grouse habitat. Up to 30 inches long and 2 feet tall, this genetically unique population cannot survive where sagebrush does not exist. Protecting this critical habitat is a fundamental part of the on-going operations.

Smoke may worsen symptoms for people who have heart or lung disease, or other pre-existing respiratory conditions such as respiratory allergies, asthma, and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). When smoke levels are high enough, even healthy people may experience some of these symptoms.

The Sierra Front Cooperators, led by Incident Commander Mike Brown, have been managing the incident after taking over the fire at 0600 on August 19, 2013. Throughout the week, the participation of cooperators throughout northern Nevada and California has been essential to the success of firefighting efforts. Cooperators include U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Nevada Division of Forestry, National Guard, Nevada Division of Emergency Management, CalFire, California State Parks, Reno Fire Department, Sparks Fire Department, Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District, Carson City Fire Department, North Lake Tahoe Fire Protection District, Tahoe Douglas Fire Protection, Storey County Fire Department, Mason Valley Fire Department, Central Lyon County Fire Protection District, East Fork Fire Protection District, California Highway Patrol, and local law enforcement agencies.
