WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

CHECK YOUR VOTER STATUS ONLINE

Visit the Secretary of State's My Voter Status page at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov, where you can check your voter status and find your polling place. You can:

- See if you are registered to vote, and in which county.
- Check your political party preference
- Find your polling place
- Find contact information for the elections office
- Check the status of your vote-by-mail ballot or provisional ballot

SAME DAY VOTER REGISTRATION

If you forgot to register or update your voter registration, you can register to vote and vote until 8 PM on Election Day. This process is called Conditional Voter Registration, also known as "Same Day Voter Registration." Just visit the elections office, or any polling place, complete a voter registration card or online application, and vote your ballot. Once we process your registration, and determine you are eligible to vote, you will be registered to vote and your ballot will be counted.

POSTAGE PREPAID BALLOTS

No Stamp, No Problem. All California vote-by-mail ballot return envelopes have prepaid postage, ensuring that voting is free and convenient for all California voters.

TWO US SENATE CONTESTS ON BALLOTS

There are two U.S. Senate contests on the June 7, 2022, Primary Election ballot.

- The first contest is the regular election for the full 6-year term ending January 3, 2029.
- The second contest is a special vacancy election (the current officeholder is temporarily filling a vacancy) for the remainder of the current term ending January 3, 2023.

You may vote for both contests.

All voters in California will be receiving a ballot in the mail for the election. Here is how to avoid the most common mistakes made with vote-by-mail (VBM) ballots!

FILL OUT BOTH BALLOT CARDS

You will receive two ballot cards - be sure to vote both cards front and back.

SIGN YOUR ENVELOPE

Be sure to sign the return envelope provided with your ballot. Provide your residential address (NOT A P.O. BOX) in the designated area. If you need assistance signing your envelope, be sure to include the witness signature.

MISMATCHED SIGNATURES

Your signature is unique to you – making sure that your signature matches the signature on your voter registration - this is how we keep your ballot safe.

If you can't remember how you signed your registration card, or if your signature has changed, re-register now to update your file. Visit www.registertovote.ca.gov or request a paper registration card by calling the Mono County Elections office at (760)932-5537.

IF YOU HAVE MOVED

The United States Postal Service (USPS) does not forward most election mail, including ballots. If you have moved, or changed your mailing address, you will not receive your ballot and may have to vote provisionally! To avoid delays, please contact us immediately to update your information.

DFADLINE

Ballots must be returned by 8:00 P.M. on Election Day. You can return your ballot by:

Mailing it via U.S. Postal Service; or

Hand delivering it to the Mono County Elections office; or

Dropping it off at any polling place, vote center, vote-by-mail drop-off location, or drop box in the State of California.

VOTING AT THE POLLING PLACE

If you decide to vote in person at your assigned polling place, be sure to BRING YOUR BALLOT with you. If you do not bring the ballot that you received in the mail, you may have to vote a provisional ballot at the polling place.



Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act and Voter-Nominated Offices

The **Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act**, which took effect January 1, 2011, requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Previously known as partisan offices, voter-nominated offices are state legislative offices, U.S. congressional offices, and state constitutional offices. Only the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election regardless of vote totals.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices can only run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate can only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election.

Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election. California's new open primary system does not apply to candidates running for U.S. President, county central committee, or local offices.

Party-Nominated/Partisan Offices

Under the California Constitution, political parties may formally nominate candidates for party-nominated/partisan offices at the primary election. A candidate so nominated will then represent that party as its official candidate for the office in question at the ensuing general election and the ballot will reflect an official designation to that effect. The top votegetter for each party at the primary election is entitled to participate in the general election. Parties also elect officers of official party committees at a partisan primary.

No voter may vote in the primary election of any political party other than the party he or she has disclosed a preference for upon registering to vote. However, a political party may authorize a person who has declined to disclose a party preference to vote in that party's primary election.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Under the California constitution, political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the following general election. A candidate for nomination or election to a voter-nominated office shall have his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, reflected on the primary and general election ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not constitute or imply an endorsement of the candidate by the party designated, or affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the qualified voters for any voter-nominated office shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. The parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the official endorsement of the party in the sample ballot.

All voters may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, provided they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two votegetters at the primary election advance to the general election for the voter-nominated office, even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation participate in the general election unless such candidate is one of the two highest votegetters at the primary election.

Nonpartisan Offices

Under the California Constitution, political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate nominated for a nonpartisan office at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the office in question at the ensuing general election. A candidate for nomination or election to a nonpartisan office may not designate his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, on the primary and general election ballot. The top two votegetters at the primary election advance to the general election for the nonpartisan office.



WARNING: ELECTIONEERING PROHIBITED!

VIOLATIONS CAN LEAD TO FINES AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHERE:

• Within the immediate vicinity of a person in line to cast their ballot or within 100 feet of the entrance of a polling place, curbside voting or drop box the following activities are prohibited.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- DO NOT ask a person to vote for or against any candidate or ballot measure.
- DO NOT display a candidate's name, image, or logo.
- DO NOT block access to or loiter near any ballot drop boxes.
- *DO NOT* provide any material or audible information for or against any candidate or ballot measure near any polling place, vote center, or ballot drop box.
- *DO NOT* circulate any petitions, including for initiatives, referenda, recall, or candidate nominations.
- DO NOT distribute, display, or wear any clothing (hats, shirts, signs, buttons, stickers) that
 include a candidate's name, image, logo, and/or support or oppose any candidate or ballot
 measure.
- DO NOT display information or speak to a voter about the voter's eligibility to vote.

The electioneering prohibitions summarized above are set forth in Article 7 of Chapter 4 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.



WARNING: CORRUPTING THE VOTING PROCESS IS PROHIBITED!

VIOLATIONS SUBJECT TO FINE AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- DO NOT commit or attempt to commit election fraud.
- *DO NOT* provide any sort of compensation or bribery to, in any fashion or by any means induce or attempt to induce, a person to vote or refrain from voting.
- DO NOT illegally vote.
- DO NOT attempt to vote or aide another to vote when not entitled to vote.
- *DO NOT* engage in electioneering; photograph or record a voter entering or exiting a polling place; or obstruct ingress, egress, or parking.
- DO NOT challenge a person's right to vote or prevent voters from voting; delay the process of
 voting; or fraudulently advise any person that he or she is not eligible to vote or is not registered
 to vote.
- DO NOT attempt to ascertain how a voter voted their ballot.
- *DO NOT* possess or arrange for someone to possess a firearm in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- DO NOT appear or arrange for someone to appear in the uniform of a peace officer, guard, or security personnel in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with any component of a voting system.
- DO NOT forge, counterfeit, or tamper with the returns of an election.
- DO NOT alter the returns of an election.
- DO NOT tamper with, destroy, or alter any polling list, official ballot, or ballot container.
- *DO NOT* display any unofficial ballot collection container that may deceive a voter into believing it is an official collection box.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with copy of the results of votes cast.
- DO NOT coerce or deceive a person who cannot read or an elder into voting for or against a candidate or measure contrary to their intent.
- DO NOT act as an election officer when you are not one.

EMPLOYERS cannot require or ask their employee to bring their vote by mail ballot to work or ask their employee to vote their ballot at work. At the time of payment of salary or wages, employers cannot enclose materials that attempt to influence the political opinions or actions of their employee.

PRECINCT BOARD MEMBERS cannot attempt to determine how a voter voted their ballot or, if that information is discovered, disclose how a voter voted their ballot.

The prohibitions on activity related to corruption of the voting process summarized above are set forth in Chapter 6 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.



Sign up to track your ballot

Where's my ballot?

The Mono County Elections office is now offering voters a new way to track and receive notifications on the status of their vote-by-mail ballot. Sign-up at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov to receive automatic email, SMS (text), or voice call notifications about your ballot.



Facts about voting by mail in Mono County

After a ballot is received by the elections department, it is checked in for tracking purposes. Every signature and address is compared to the information on the voter's registration card. If something doesn't match, the elections department will contact the voter to let them know. After all ballots are accepted for counting, they are carefully removed from their envelopes, ensuring that the voters' privacy is protected. Once all ballots are removed from their envelopes, they are counted by central scanning equipment and then sealed in containers that are only opened for the post-election audit. Voter's privacy and their vote are always protected throughout the process.

- Postage is pre-paid on all mailed ballots.
- All signatures are compared to the signature on your voter registration card.
- If the signature doesn't match, you will be contacted and be given an opportunity to correct the issue.
- You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still count.
- If you make a mistake, you can ask for a replacement ballot.

Accessible Voting

At the Polling Place

All Pollng Places are ADA Accessible. Poll Workers are available to assist.

A poll worker may also take a regular ballot to the physically handicapped person at a place as near as possible to the polling place and which is accessible to such person, qualify that person to vote, and return the voted ballot to the polling place (EC 14282). If you are unable to mark your ballot, you may bring up to two people to the polls to assist you with voting. This person cannot be your employer or anyone who works for your employer, nor your labor union leader or anyone who works for your labor union.



Accessible Voting System

Each Polling Place has a ballot marking device that offers:

- An audio option that reads the ballot to you.
- A handheld tactile device with a universal plug for a personal assistive device.
- Large text size.

Instructions for Voters Requesting an RAVBM Ballot

Voters who are disabled, can't leave their home, have a hard time filling out their ballot, or who wish to vote remotely can request a Remote Accessible Vote by Mail Ballot (RAVBM). An RAVBM ballot is emailed to the voter to download, print, fill out by pen, and mail back to our office to be counted.
