**1. CALL TO ORDER & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** Chair John Peters called the meeting to order at 9:09 a.m. at the Town/County Conference Room, Minaret Village Mall, Mammoth Lakes. Attendees recited pledge of allegiance to the flag.

**2. PUBLIC COMMENT:** Haislip Hayes, Town of Mammoth Lakes, indicated Lakes Basin road is cleared, but no power or water, so USFS has not reopened. Thirty signs ordered, contractor to replace fencing, guard rails. Main Street sidewalk project moving forward, traffic controls upcoming. Horseshoe curb/gutter/drainage project out to bid. Soliciting RFQ (Request for Qualifications) for new airport terminal.

Brent Green, Caltrans, introduced Laura Espinosa from San Diego to replace retired Craig Holste.

#### 3. MINUTES

**<u>MOTION</u>**: Approve minutes of May 8, 2017, as submitted (Holler/Stump. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.)

4. COMMISSIONER REPORTS: Stump: None. Wentworth: Advised Town Council about CTC meeting in fall. Ribbon cutting July 1. Sustainable recreation. Sherwins mountain bike trail. Built using soils we have to USFS guidelines. Trail is cross country, cruising, family-friendly (no e-bikes). Enviro field work this summer. Build trails every summer now. Holler: Multi-use trail. July 8-9 trails workshop. Mono funded fire crews on new trail. Walk/bike/ride to Town Council in July. SCE drawing down lake levels at June Lake. Campground/trail closures. Stump: Earthquake in 1800s, Agnew dam refurbished few years ago. Sky crane in June Mountain parking lot. Holler: No date on campground openings. Wentworth: Funding winter sports specialist, USFS liaison with Town, USFS budget cut coming up. Peters: Thanked Caltrans crew for SR 108, concerns about pack station. Huge impact for east side when it opens. New striping on Walker Canyon makes big safety difference. Spent time with Rep. Paul Cook, mentioned walk/bike/ride, CTC. Seemed supportive. Thanked Hayes/Dutton for meeting last week to understand Town goings on. USFS/trails: Looking at Humboldt-Toiyabe for assistance, Jeremy Marshall. Proactive approach with Bridgeport winter recreation area, yurt operators who want more for backcountry skiing opportunities in Dunderberg area. Stump: Policy differences in USFS regions 5 and 4. Found Humboldt-Toiyabe easier to work with. Inyo increasing mandatory snow coverage for snowmobiles, so decreasing use. Wentworth: Inyo staff will have final draft of Inyo Forest Plan by October so decision by early 2018. Get consistent policy framework across Mono. Peters: Randy Moore of USFS approved late commercial at Mammoth and Virginia lakes, crew of 40-50.

#### 5. ADMINISTRATION

A. **Unmet Transit Needs:** Michael Draper mentioned May 8 meeting added new needs to update resolution. Two comments: Walker DAR (Dial-A-Ride) Fridays (unmet, but not reasonable to meet, as not meet farebox threshold), evening service at Mammoth Lakes (nighttime trolley already).

Stump disagreed about Walker, saying it *is* reasonable to meet. Community relatively isolated, citizens no longer able to drive. Friday Walker Senior Center happening. Lifeline service to some. To maintain healthy community north, should be reasonable to meet. More analysis OK with him. Seniors need support.

Wendy Sugimura quoted "reasonable to meet" in R98-01 with five criteria. LTC could choose to fund it anyway. Legal implication if unmet, reasonable, cannot dedicate funds to local roads.

Stump reviewed categories, no lifeline quality of life reference. Many routes are not cost effective, but considered lifeline service. Maybe amend R98-01 to include quality of lifeline service. Four days/week already failing to meet provisions.

Sugimura noted quality of life is addressed through necessity of life needs. Doing disservice to transportation issue. Look at State law.

Stump was interested in Walker DAR Fridays. Sugimura reminded LTC could fund it.

Holler suggested requesting another \$10,000 at budget time. Sugimura stated budget is zero sum, so if added, drop something else.

Peters wanted to find way to create service even though not sustainable unmet need. Fridays in Walker would be highest day of use. He requested full day Friday. Where would money come from? Sugimura cited LTC budget discussion. Excellent transit service exists in rural area. Don't have economies of scale. Peters affirmed psychological need on Friday. Consistent daily would increase use throughout week. Need is growing, hopefully use would as well.

**MOTION:** Approve Resolution R17-05 on Unmet Transit Needs and consider funding source (*Stump/Holler. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.*)

B. **TDA (Transportation Development Act):** Megan Mahaffey gave overview. TDA complies with RTP (Regional Transportation Plan), which is broken down into LTF (Local Transportation Funds) and STA (State Transit Assistance). LTF is based on estimate. ESTA did not include Walker DAR (Dial-A-Ride). Approve resolution as is, bring proposal to fund DAR by reserve.

Reserve roll over year to year? Gets split. Excess allocated to Town & County.

Authorize full amount for option 1 out of reserve, later decide option 1 or 2? LTC would allocate portion of reserve for X up to that amount. Could allocate \$20,000 to fund DAR. Or next fiscal year.

Holler noted no set policy for use of reserve. If move forward, increase ESTA.

Line item to meet need? Could put more in reserve later. Reserve allocated for specific use (DAR), set aside for up to three years.

Holler wanted to analyze use, see farebox. Reduce reserve by \$18,000, to ESTA for Antelope Valley. Gear up by July? *Jill Batchelder noted moving 75% to 100% staffing, could be quick turnaround time.* 

For June service? Batchelder noted July 6 start. Megan Foster saw enough time to publicize.

If not allocated through ESTA, where is it? Pull out as separate line item. Current DAR through total service allocation to ESTA.

Funding start from upstream? SB 1? New funding source to supplement. Additional funding source would affect overall transportation.

<u>MOTION</u>: Adopt R17-06 for LTF (Local Transportation Fund) allocation as amended to remove \$18,000 from reserve to allocate toward fifth day in Walker (*Stump/Wentworth. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.*)

Holler mentioned bike path program, connecting elements in it. On-road, separate path, or multi-use path. Leave funding in reserve.

Mahaffey cited \$36,418 for town bike path and \$36,602 for county bike path. Keep separate. Use only for bike/pedestrian.

MOTION: Approve Resolution R17-06 (Holler/Wentworth. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.)

**<u>MOTION</u>**: Approve Resolution R17-07 for STA (State Transit Assistance) allocation (Holler/Wentworth. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.

C. **OWP (Overall Work Program):** Gerry Le Francois noted Caltrans changes are incorporated. Access to/from airport, not on site. Can't fund environmental. \$10,000 from Pavement to Trails, now \$15,000.

Any requirements from SB 1? RPA from state budget. PPM tied to RTIP. SB 1 webinars. Potential new revenue.

Airport access? Wrap into access road to airports? RPA to get to facility only, not on site.

From 395 exit to Town property? Yes.

Wentworth stated Mammoth's air quality is tied to NOAA weather station.

Stump noted Great Basin has system to assess PM-2.5 and PM-10, but not complete weather stations. Can't log on to get humidity, wind speed, etc. Requested tie APCD in with remote weather station near Bridgeport for avalanche.

Wentworth suggested Shady Rest meeting on next winter. Agencies need to figure it out. Joint Board of Supervisors/Town Council meeting June 18 will consider resources already queued up around recreation.

**MOTION:** Approve Minute Order M17-03 for final OWP authorizing \$10,000 from pavement to trails, clean up typos. (Wentworth/Holler. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.)

#### 6. LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

A. **End-of-winter debrief:** Gerry Le Francois thought August or September. Johnston wanted fall, not winter. Outreach needed.

Le Francois suggested agency participation. Be inclusive. Long meeting. Other entities included Humboldt-Toiyabe, sheriff, CHP, MLPD, agriculture commissioner, ESTA, CPT, Marine base. Dates at next meeting. Agenda? *Agenda plus items*. Site? *Mammoth with teleconferencing*. Actions or info only? Stump: Should be learning. Communications problems on avalanche impact. Closures publicized. How do it differently with pre-staging resources. Institutional knowledge gone after earlier heavy winters, so relearning. Lack of action taking care of roofs resulted in damage.

Peters saw common thread as communication piece. How administer meeting?

Wentworth noted Town has consultant looking at communications program overall. Coordinate to hear input/output. Get trails coordinator.

Peters thought Town/Mono as lead, Stump wanted to break out priorities: health/safety, building effects. Stump suggested CAO/Holler/sheriff/MLPD chief/Caltrans decide on format.

B. **CTC (California Transportation Commission) subcommittee:** Gerry Le Francois spoke with Kern COG (Council of Governments), Caltrans District 9. CTC commissioners accustomed to urban/suburban format, sales tax revenue, self-help counties. West has different uses. Economic Development could do piece on tourist impact. Land use component. Economic struggle with revenue. Highlight Bridgeport Main Street, Lake Mary Bike Path, Rock Creek Road, Convict Lake Road, and Digital-395 broadband capacity.

Tack on stuff northbound? Show improvements on MOUs.

Wentworth mentioned netting going up at Olancha/Cartago. Le Francois reminded Inyo/Mono paying for project. Lots to highlight.

Le Francois suggested subcommittee: Wentworth, Peters, Courtney Smith, Kern COG, ESTA, Caltrans, and USFS. Local sales tax measures, tourist trips. Bring dollars outside pot of CTC money.

Stump wanted to let CTC know what Mono *doesn't* have – light rail, high-speed trains. Maximize what we do have; e.g., interconnectivity via ESTA from Reno to Lancaster to LAX. Local forethought. Importance of MOU projects someplace else.

Green stated Caltrans chief deputy and others may attend.

#### 7. TRANSIT

A. Eastern Sierra Transit Authority (ESTA): Jill Batchelder quipped, "Welcome to grant season."

- 1. <u>MOTION</u>: Approve Resolution R17-09 for 5311 for 2017 apportionment funds of \$76,622 (Holler/Wentworth. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.)
- 2. <u>MOTION</u>: Approve Resolution R17-10 for 5311 for 2018 apportionment funds (Holler/Wentworth. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.)

- 3. <u>MOTION</u>: Approve Resolution R17-11 for 5311f funds (Holler/Wentworth. Ayes: 4. Absent: Johnston, Richardson.)

**ESTA updates:** Bishop Creek route twice daily. Mammoth Express to extend lower rates, increased ridership.

B. **Yosemite Area Regional Transportation System (YARTS):** Michael Draper spoke with Dick Whittington, who had 1,300 reservations for 395 corridor. Cancellation notices up till June 24 due to pass closure. Nice thank-you letters on refunds. Most reservations on 395. Looking at obligations if high camps and stores not open. Green Bridge project outside El Portal has no structural problem.

#### 8. CALTRANS

A. Activities in Mono County & pertinent statewide information: Laurie Espinosa stated still snowing on SR 108; SR 120 both sides reached crest last week; guardrail repair, rocks/debris cleanup, cornice, avalanche potential; large slide at Olmsted Point, trees to be removed; SR 203: snow removal beyond lodge starts today. SR 158: water on road last week due to water release.

Wentworth noted crushed structures at Tioga Pass Resort, so won't open at all.

Green indicated Walker canyon project started today. SHOPP (State Highway Operation & Protection Program) presentation in Sacramento on snow blowers, lively debate whether snow blowers are exempt from requirements. Work with manufacturer to upgrade equipment. Designed for clearing driveways, not "Sierra cement."

Stump identified primary pollutant as wood smoke or dust caused by wind. Stationary agriculture equipment exempted. Can be advocacy in Sacramento by local APCD (Air Pollution Control District). Equipment not right for job.

Green mentioned district directors met last week, unknowns on SB 1. Anticipate more accountability. Show SB 1 working. Images of 395 road conditions, do periodically. Most projects require extensive environmental review. Not to fruition till November 2018 election when repeal could come up. Get as many projects as possible. No money to support work crews until November. Use overtime as mechanism to develop projects. Highway maintenance is robust program. Prioritization of projects: Espinoza noted hiring plan, training, etc.

Green clarified Ryan Dermody handles planning, LTC interaction, whereas Espinoza heads operations. Philosophically, each team has its mission. Projects: maintenance or active transportation? Gray area on stewardship, cost. FHWA (Federal Highway Administration) liaison Fast Act levels should remain. TIGER (Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery) grants \$500 million not selected yet by FHWA (Federal Highway Administration).

Wentworth stated projects are queued up, looking at public/private funding. Sidewalks on 203, with efforts beyond highway considered. If housing is issue for Caltrans, contact. Holler mentioned housing needs assessment. Stump thought housing seemed to focus on buildings, not infrastructure, jobs, etc.; e.g., McGee Creek station. No easy solution to infrastructure due to cost.

Construction time frame? Delays? Green stated Caltrans will try not to overlap projects, limit blackout dates like July 4. Maybe stuck in several delays.

Peters wanted to get word to local communities on SR182 option.

**1. CALL TO ORDER & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** Chair John Peters called the meeting to order at 9:03 a.m. at the Town/County Conference Room, Minaret Village Mall, Mammoth Lakes. Attendees recited pledge of allegiance to the flag. A moment of silence was held in honor of woman killed in terrorist attack in Charlottesville, VA, during white supremacist violence over removal of Robert E. Lee statue over weekend.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT: No items

**3. MINUTES:** Continue minutes of June 12, 2017 (*no July meeting*) as amended to Sept. 11 meeting: Item 8A, graph 6: Gray area on stewardship/cost. Departments have different roles.

4. COMMISSIONER REPORTS: Stump: Commended Caltrans for turn pocket on US 6 and Mono public works for flood damage repair on Crowley Lake Drive. Dispute on funding. Road reopened for high volume of recreational traffic. Dermody: Road crew and engineers were on different tracks, missed funding opportunity. Focus meeting on roles/responsibilities. Stump: Email CAO, Jeff Walters, Garrett Higerd on communication. Dermody recalled past issues occurred as well. Dutton: Airport RFQ got eight quality responses. Upper Main Street sidewalk will begin next Monday, demolishing railroad tie wall. Under SB 1 Town eligible to reapply for sidewalks on Lower Main, maybe finish whole project. CTC reprogrammed grant for roundabout to lower sidewalks. FLAP grant \$.14 mil for Reds Meadow Road, USFS funded environmental, support letters received from Town, Inyo & Mono LTCs. Full rebuild, two lanes. Encourage start sooner. FWHA did sign schedule for Upper Rock Creek, citizen noted problem. He thanked ESTA for help on Reds Meadow. Hogan: Final section of 580 in Nevada involved lots of money and time, now open. Great artwork, landscaping. Overpasses have Old West images of wild horses. Share with CTC (California Transportation Commission), ask NDOT (Nevada Department of Transportation) for photos. Beautiful freeways. Deer overcrossings in Nevada. Richardson: Back East visitors commended our great roads. Motorcycle ride to Murphys via Sonora Pass, spectacular drive. Switchback curves beat up from winter. Easy fix? Green: Some immediate repairs, west side looks better than east side. Caltrans doing shoulder work and dig-outs in critical frog habitat so enviro issues exist (Dermody). Peters: Task force is meeting to identify recreation opportunities in Mono. Caltrans' is driving force behind this. Brent Green gave critical input, Recommendation to BOS, Repair to provide access at lower Summers Meadow Road, bridge washed out June 17, access restored last weekend. Plan to replace bridge as part of federal bridge inventory. Not require SB 1 funds. \$750,000 repair/replace before winter. County roads are being striped, hundreds of miles throughout fall, BOS approved ordinance of temporary roughly graded road to allow ATV events in fall, worked with new CHP commander from Redding and sheriffs. CHP is OK with safety aspect of events using roads used in past. Mammoth sign board has missing slot in middle. Stump: Commissioner Johnston is undergoing radiation and chemo, back in September. Appears to tolerate treatment.

#### 5. ADMINISTRATION

A. **STIP (State Transportation Improvement Plan) fund estimate:** Gerry Le Francois noted LTC looks at it every two years. Fund estimate looks fairly robust for Mono LTC. CTC will consider adoption this week. Currently working with agency partners on MOU projects. Fund estimate \$12 million, big amount. In 2016, MOU projects were defunded, in better position now. Sent letter to Winzenread. Freeman Gulch segment 1 paid by Inyo and Mono, who expect payback for moving project forward. Meet with partners on projects that were deleted. Freeman Gulch segments 2 and 3, final project Olancha/Cartago.

North Conway first project? Already had Topaz project in District 9's SHOPP (State Highway Operation & Protection Program) program, so much less effect on STIP shares. MOUs keep going. Prioritize projects. Bridgeport Valley passing lanes, Conway Ranch. Dermody noted freight funding streams now available.

Wildlife mitigation part of Conway? Dermody indicated not part of focus yet.

Le Francois reported staff meeting with Eastern Sierra partners. District 8 reached out on projects by Adelanto. State spending lots of money on SR 58 with big focus on truck traffic. Spoke with Kern COG staff, whose focus is elsewhere, like Centennial Freeway in Bakersfield area. Mono and Inyo have ongoing commitment on Hwy 14. Kern recognizes Mono's commitment. Figure out how much money may come to us. Winzenread wants continued focus on MOUs. Standing agenda item till mid-December. May need special meeting to make deadline. Peters volunteered to attend.

Hogan recalled lots of southbound traffic midweek on Conway really holds up traffic.

#### 6. LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

A. **End-of-winter debrief:** Gerry Le Francois did outreach to others, like Monterey County, something similar, will send questionnaire, recommended FEMA input. OWP component, so send questionnaire to agencies. Dutton mentioned Sept. 20 at Town Council. Le Francois will ask for input. Peters did not want to wait too long.

B. **CTC (California Transportation Commission) subcommittee:** Gerry Le Francois met with staff, District 9, CTC staff to develop draft agenda. Wentworth, Peters, Corless have block of rooms at Village. CTC staff wants webcast of first day. Afternoon theme of partnerships, presentations by Inyo LTC and Mono BOS. Piece on land use and recreation. District 9 input.

How many attendees? Le Francois thought 30-40. Tie in Dick Whittington for YARTS connection. Le Francois noted Town funds trolley by general tax, money for feet-first focus. Hogan wanted to waive YARTS, as no funding except NPS. Hogan would like to do history of Reds Meadow in 1970-80s. Only other path is PCT (Pacific Crest Trail).

Le Francois suggested Reds Meadow tour on day two. Lake Mary Bike Trail another multi-agency effort. Hogan wanted to notify Madera County as well, as it collects TOT.

Audience outreach? State Parks, NPS. Air travel ties in. Elected officials from Inyo and Mono, Inyo LTC and BOS, courtesy invite to USFS, CHP; notifying RPACs.

Suggestions: Name badges; placards on table; ticket for first drink at mixer; list of contacts; RSVPs. Limited time here, so don't over-dilute with issues, many specific requests. Focus on Eastern Sierra education, transportation. Support what we *do* have (buses not trains). Emphasize bike/pedestrian component. Delete Reds field trip (put grant in PowerPoint). Lakes Basin better for compressed field trip. Bring in Inyo issues. One field trip covering several topics: mountain summit, Lakes Basin (shows trolleys, bike trailers). Get info packet of partnerships.

Green suggested talking points with takeaways. Scope of region, physical element, diversity of valley, population types, land uses, recreation activities, highway as main street, mountain pass winter closures, shoulder-widening projects. Intent for SB 1 funding. Build big to small for frame of reference. Peters offered to organize Tioga Pass, Bodie tour first day.

Hogan suggested community planners like Bill Taylor and Karen Johnston for institutional knowledge.

Green thought CTC needs frame of reference to show investing money wisely. CTC commissioners are developers.

**1. Walker Dial-A-Ride**: Jill Batchelder cited 152,000 rides in Mono, passengers/hr up 11% over last quarter. Reds Meadow started later this year. Ridership: 30%-40% increase in Mammoth Express.

Friday in Walker had same riders as other weekdays. June Lake shuttle in July better than last year, but not stellar. Fluctuated wildly. Free this year with funding from LTF (Local Transportation Funds) and local businesses.

Dutton commended ESTA for being ready day after routes in Mammoth opened. Batchelder noted 395 route runs all weekdays now, new days filling up. Mammoth Express discount passes continued.

Peters stated users in Walker area appreciative. Vibrant place on Fridays.

2. ESTA Gray Line: Batchelder cited some public meetings through Town and ESTA. Ridership just not there to continue, so ceased. How to do turnaround to serve those areas? Need exists, but not in volume of other areas.

Hogan reminded of locals, kids who counted on it. Underserving residents. Voted many years ago to fund transit. Cut back during hard times. Part of Measure U is transit. Amazing that community committed to transit. Richardson stated it's not abandoned area, working on turnaround.

B. **Yosemite Area Regional Transportation System (YARTS):** Dick Whittington got grant from FLAP (Federal Lands Access Program) first ever transit-funded project. Run free service on free park entry days for three-year trial period. Lots of brochures in tourism boxes (6,000), on 395.. About 15,000 reservations online. Hired part-time staffer. Transaction fee might encourage people to stick with reservations. Attended regional meeting with Hogan recently.

YARTS annual meeting? Already met.

Green noted YARTS meeting with Caltrans headquarters tomorrow for information sharing. Dermody suggested three Caltrans districts get involved with YARTS for funding streams.

#### 8. CALTRANS

A. Eastern Sierra Nevada Freight Study/Cambridge Systematics: Ryan Dermody noted competitive grant awarded after two years, and introduced presenter Dan Anderson.

What is a truck? Tractor/trailer, 18-wheeler.

Peters cited use of air brakes as an issue in North County. Maybe study could mention in questionnaire. Where will public outreach occur? *Primary one-on-one with manufacturing, warehouse facilities, truckers. No traditional public meeting, as only handful of people usually shows up.* 

Stump indicated Benton tribe wants truck stop north of store/restaurant at former trailer park area. Edison is upgrading maintenance station at Chidago Canyon Road for greater service. Power could allow such a project sans generators.

Crestview rest area? Open now. All rest areas full of trucks. Wintertime opening is key. Peters noted new truck stop south of Gardnerville now pretty busy for data collection.

B. **Mono County activities & pertinent statewide information:** Ryan Dermody noted camera, weather stations, signal timing, etc. Getting consultant next February on grant. Another grant for Complete Streets (non-motorized).

Used for major feeder designations? Roads as detours? Pushing people off main highway for bikes?

Peters noted County roads are used for detours in Antelope Valley, leading to erosion/deterioration. Grants available for natural detour if 395 closed? Dermody indicated yes. Some bridges have weight restrictions. Hazard Mitigation Plan could address alternative routes. Paul Roten stated any alternate use degrades roads.

Austin West, from Oakland and UC Irvine, traveled to NY, VT, NH, and ME: Awful roads.

Dermody noted small construction window in Mono. Green stated all hires ramped up substantially, as SB 1 has money, but vacancies need staffing. Wanted no vacancies by November. Doing more, and when winter hits, will do better than last year.

9. **INFORMATIONAL:** Paul Roten noted public works has pavement preservation process funding next year.

10. UPCOMING AGENDA ITEMS: 1) SB 1; 2) quarterlies; 3) CTC run-through; 4) LTC quorum, look at County alternate commissioner issue, maybe standing staff alternate like Town for continuity? Peters recalled conflict with ESTA or YARTS. Burns stated Commissioner Johnston had strong preference for elected officials. Stump reminded LTC needs to transact business. Burns suggested 5) LTC Handbook; Peters wanted to better coordinate with Caltrans on not missing opportunities when not on same page,

maybe DPW. Stump noted staff is overloaded. Maybe checklist on grant opportunities. 6) DPW (Department of Public Works) on jail, new facility.

The remaining projects are Olancha Cartago, Freeman Gluch segments 2 and 3.

Caltrans submits the draft Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP) to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) in October. This item will also be discussed at the CTC Town Hall on Sept. 13, 2017.

#### I. INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

#### Background

The Mono County Local Transportation Commission (MCLTC) was created by joint resolution of the Mono County Board of Supervisors (Res. 84-93, dated August 21, 1984) and the Mammoth Lakes Town Council (Rex. 84-26, dated August 20, 1984). Pursuant to Government Code Section 29535, the Mono County Local Transportation Commission thus created was designated by the Secretary of Business, Transportation and Housing as the regional transportation planning agency for Mono County on October 1, 1984. The MCLTC replaced the Mono County Transportation Commission, which served as the transportation planning agency for Mono County from April 1, 1972, through December 1984.

#### Purpose

The Mono County LTC serves as the lead transportation and planning and administrative agency for transportation projects and programs in the Mono County region. The MCLTC's primary functions include:

- 1. Administration of Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds
- 2. Preparation, adoption and submittal of a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) to the California Department of Transportation and California Transportation Commission
- 3. Preparation of an annual Overall Work Program (OWP)
- 4. Preparation and adoption of a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP)
- 5. Review of and comment on the Interregional Improvement Plan (IIP) contained in the State Transportation Improvement program (STIP)
- 6. Review of and prioritization of grant applications for various funding programs
- 7. Facilitation of public education, awareness and involvement in regional transportation planning and programming

#### II. ORGANIZATION

#### **Membership**

Consistent with state law, the MCLTC consists of six commissioners – three commissioners appointed by the Town of Mammoth Lakes Town Council and three commissioners appointed by the Mono County Board of Supervisors. Each appointing authority may also select up to three alternative members to serve in the absence of their respective regular members. In most instances, the appointing authorities select commissioners that also serve as members of the Mammoth Lakes Town Council and Mono County Board of Supervisors.

In recognition of the strong partnership between the MCLTC and Caltrans, the District 9 Director or designee is invited to sit at the table with the MCLTC to facilitate Caltrans participation and advice on commission matters.
